1. Salt Palace, Uyuni, Bolivia



The Palacio de Sal –‘Salt Palace’— is on the salt flat of Uyuni in southwest Bolivia. The site is 350 km south of Bolivia’s capital city, La Paz. It attracts tourists from all over the world.

There’s an impressive lobby, a bar and 16 rooms with private bathrooms, central heating and air-conditioning. The hotel has a dry sauna and a saltwater pool. The floor, walls and ceiling are made of salt! There isn’t ordinary furniture, the beds, tables and chairs are made of salt, too!

The restaurant’s specialty? Salt chicken, naturally.



2. Ottawa Jail Hostel



You can sleep in a prison in Ottawa, the capital city of Canada. Do not worry; there aren't any criminals anymore! The Ottawa Jail is a hostel. It is located at 75 Nicholas St. Everybody calls it Nicholas Street Jail or Ottawa Jail.

Visitors can get a picture of life in prison because there are daily guided tours.

The original structure is intact. There are still bars on the doors and windows!

In the old courtyard space there is now a beautiful outdoor bar. It opens only in summer.

There are photographs of famous criminals that were in prison on the walls of the bar.

The old cells are now single, double, or group rooms. Some rooms have kitchenette facilities.

The hostel offers free breakfast, free Wi-Fi, and individual lockers. There is air conditioning, too.

3. The Station, Lobos, Argentina



You can sleep in a train car in Lobos, just 100 km away from Buenos Aires, the capital city of Argentina.

La Estación (The Station) is a unique place. The trains are completely restored. There are rooms for two, four and six guests. They have microwaves, a TV, heating and air conditioning. At the station there are gardens with beautiful old trees.



Card 1. Teatro Colón

The Teatro Colón is the main opera house in Buenos Aires, Argentina. It is in the heart of the city. There are two entrances: one on Libertad Street and the other on Cerrito Street.

It first opened on May 25th, 1908.

It is the third best opera house in the world. It is world famous for its exceptional acoustics and architecture.

The auditorium has 2,487 seats, and standing room for 1,000. The building has 6 floors above ground and 3 below ground. There are 7 elevators. It has a large central chandelier with 700 light bulbs.

The theatre has its own permanent orchestra and ballet companies, as well as a choir. It has its own production workshops that make the shoes and costumes the singers and dancers wear.

You can also study at the theatre. It offers programs in Dance, Vocal Performance, Orchestral Academy, Operatic Staging and Direction, Musical Preparation of Opera and Theatrical Wig and Make-Up Artistry.

Card 2. Pasaje Barolo

Pasaje/Palace Barolo is an incredible work of architecture located in Buenos Aires' historic city center on Avenida de Mayo and Hipólito Yrigoyen, in the neighborhood of Monserrat. Its construction was completed in 1923.

The poem *The Divine Comedy* by Dante Alighieri inspired the construction of this building, so it has three parts: a paradise, a purgatory and an inferno. The nine domes the building has represent the access to hell (or the inferno). There are twenty two floors, two basements, eleven circular balconies and a lighthouse at the top. The view is beautiful!

The Barolo is not a residential building. Nobody lives in it. It is an office building. It has its own generator. A very modern building for its time!

There are guided tours both during the day (every day except on Tuesdays) and at night (on Tuesdays and Fridays). During the tour, you can visit an office decorated in the 1920s style.

If you visit The Barolo, take a look at the futuristic lifts in the hall on the ground floor.

Card 3. The Planetarium

The Galileo Galilei planetarium, commonly known as Planetario, is located in Parque Tres de Febrero in the Palermo district of Buenos Aires. The Planetarium first opened to the public on April 5th, 1968.

The building has five floors, six staircases and a twenty-meter diameter hall room with three hundred and sixty seats. The inside of the semi-spherical dome is covered with aluminum.



What is there in the spaces around us?

The planetarium itself is located in the centre. It has over one hundred projectors and it is approximately five metres tall and weighs 2.5 tons. It has independent projectors for the Moon, the Sun and the visible planets (Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn) and two spheres in the extremes that project 8,900 stars, constellations and nebulas.

The Planetarium is an interesting place to visit. You can do courses in astronomy. There are talks and guided tours. You can also see an interactive exhibition. Don't miss the simulators. They are a lot of fun!

There are shows for children and you can see the stars through the telescopes. Check out the timetables.

There is a museum in the planetarium, too. It has a piece of lunar rock brought to Earth by the Apollo XI mission, a gift from Richard Nixon. The museum is also home to a collection of 100-million-year-old sea life fossils from Neuquén. At the entrance you can see a meteorite that fell in the Province of Chaco.

Card 4. National Library

This building opened on May 10th, 1992, but the National Library was founded on September 13th, 1810. It is named after its founder and first director, Mariano Moreno.

The National Library has a [brutalist architectural style](#). It stands in the neighbourhood of Recoleta. There are beautiful gardens around it. It has seven floors and three basements. On the top floor there is a terrace with a lovely view to the river on one side and to the city on the other.

The library houses valuable collections of books, maps, magazines, newspapers, scores, visual materials, recordings, and photographs.

The newspaper library is on the first basement. Researchers can access large databases and consult archives if they have a permit.



What is there in the spaces around us?

At the library, users can do activities to learn strategies to use archives and documents. They can also develop skills to have easy access to digital information.

There is an auditorium and an exhibition room on the third floor. The reading rooms are on the fifth and six floors. There are computers and a photocopier on the fifth floor. On every floor there are lockers so you can leave your personal belongings in a safe place. There are two large lifts, but it is always quicker to use the stairs. If you feel hungry or thirsty there is a kiosk on the second floor.

The library offers many cultural activities: it gives workshops and organizes talks. It has its own choir as well.

There are guided tours every day at 4 p.m. except on Sundays. Schools can book special visits from Monday to Friday at 2 p.m.


